

## Brumby Means Luxury

If you're not one of the lucky 1000 coeds living in **Brumby** Hall, take time today for a tour of the nine-story luxury dorm, which features almost all the comforts of home.

Featuring rooms similar to those in the sister dormitory, **Creswell**, **Brumby** has the added conveniences of air conditioning with adjustable room thermostats, private phone in each room, larger closets and color co-ordinated extra-long bulletin boards.

**Brumby** features luxuries available not only for its residents, but also their visitors. In the octagonal-shaped lobby

there are TV lounges, each with color television, and two date parlors which, although do not afford complete privacy, do provide a relatively quiet place to talk or play cards. These date parlors have sliding glass doors which open on to patios, thus making possible warm weather parties both indoors and out.

Other conveniences include house phones in the lobby,

which boys use to call for their dates. There are informal lounges for the girls on all the floors above the first, and the luxury of laundry rooms, complete with two washers and dryers, on floors three, five, seven and nine.

Storage space is marvelous. There are trunk storage rooms on each floor, and even for storing evening dresses. And be sure to look at the water fountains . . . each has a hot water tap, very handy for making coffee or hot tea. TV outlets are in the lounges and staff personnel apartments.

Speaking of staff . . . did you know that there are four house directors, who live on the even-numbered floors, in addition to four graduate residents on the other floors, a resident counselor and assistant. Also there are a housekeeper, night watchman, 18 maids and four janitors.

Although she is quite excited over the facilities of **Brumby**, she realizes that a dormitory that large will have its individual problems.
